Transformers




Dear Anonymous,

A good way to address your parents is have them sit down—just you and them—and tell them that you are getting 50's and 60's on your quizzes.








Meet the Knights





Transformers







Area students score well on college boards

High school seniors in Okaloosa County, especially those in the Twin Cities, scored well on the American College Test (ACT) earlier this year.

Rocky Bayou Christian School (RBCS) and Okaloosa-Walton College Collegiate High School (OWCCHS) students posted the highest average composite ACT scores in the county, according to figures released last month.

Niceville High School students averaged a composite score of 22.2, com-

pared with Okaloosa Walton Collegiate's average score of 25.3, Rocky Bayou Christian School's 25.2, Choctaw and Crestview's 20.3, and Fort Walton Beach's 21.6.

The voluntary college entrance tests were administered during the 2006-07 academic year to graduating seniors.

According to Florida Education Commissioner Jeanine Blomberg, 23 percent more Florida high school students took the ACT exam last school year.


Some 81,000 Floridians took the vol-

untary college entrance exam. In 2006, 53 percent of high school students took the exam. In 2005, 45 percent did.

Although the ACT is comprised of not only the subjects already mentioned, it also includes an optional writing test, one that most states no longer choose to participate in.

The composite score is an average of tests in math, reading, English and science.





Coach of first-year football program sees eagerness, effort at school's first-ever practice

NICEVILLE — Rocky Bayou Christian School's fledgling football program took its first steps on Friday.



"It's just basically trying to find a common thread here," Brodersen said. "And all these students want to pursue some form of engineering." Ultimately, the cycle will go up for sale at the school's annual auction in February.

But parts are expensive and the group could use all the support it can get.

Brodersen sees E-cycle as a baby step into the world of electricity. Down the road he envisions an electric boat. But right now, his students are still learning to walk.

Or in this case, ride.





"See You at the Pole"— A brief history

"A small group of teenagers in Burleson, Texas came together for a DiscipleNow weekend in early 1990. They came seeking God. Little did they know how powerfully God was about to move. On Saturday night God penetrated their hearts like never before. The students were broken before God and burdened for their friends. Compelled to pray, they drove to three different schools that night. Not knowing exactly what to do, they went to the school flagpoles and prayed for their friends, schools, and leaders. Those students had no idea how God would use their obedience.

God used what He did among those teenagers and others who were holding similar prayer meetings at their schools to birth a vision in the hearts of youth leaders across Texas. The vision was that students throughout Texas would follow these examples and meet at their school flagpoles to pray simultaneously. The challenge was named See You at the PoleTM at an early brainstorming session. The vision was shared with 20,000 students in June 1990 at Reunion Arena in Dallas, Texas.

Only God had envisioned how many students would step up to the challenge. At 7:00 a.m. on September 12, 1990, more than 45,000 teenagers met at school flagpoles in four different states to pray before the start of school.

A few months later a group of youth ministers from all over the country gathered together for a national conference in Colorado. Many of them reported that their students had heard about the prayer movement in Texas and were equally burdened for their schools. No other events had been planned, but it was clear that students across the country would be creating their own national day of student prayer. There was no stopping them.



On September 11, 1991, at 7:00 a.m., one million students gathered at school flagpoles all over the country. From Boston, Massachusetts, to Los Angeles, California, students came together to pray. Some sang, some read Scripture, but most importantly,

they prayed. Like those first students, they prayed for their schools, for their friends, for their leaders, and for their country.

As in all great movements of prayer, See You at the PoleTM did not begin in the hearts of people. It began in the heart of God. God used the obedience of a small group of teenagers to ignite what has become an international movement of prayer among young people.

Since 1991, See You at the PoleTM has grown to God-sized proportions. Within only a couple of years, students were praying in several countries around the world. Now, more than 3 million students from all 50 states participate in SYATP. Students in more than 20 countries take part. In places like Canada, Guam, Korea, Japan, Turkey, and the Ivory Coast, students are responding to God and taking seriously the challenge to pray.

God is continuing to call His people to repentance and prayer.
Countless inspiring testimonies of how He has used See You at the PoleTM to bring students to Christ and to change lives affirm God's power to answer those who cry out to Him in humble dependence. Bible clubs, weekly prayer meetings, and other ministries have begun on campuses where students participated in SYATP."

Rocky Bayou School's junior varsity team finished the competition with a score of 1,121 earning them the honor of placing 14th in the state and ranking 452 worldwide.





Play a Bowl of Cotton

RBCS band heading for Dallas

When people hear "Cotton Bowl," they usually think of football. But the band members of Rocky Bayou Christian School think about hours of marching and practicing, and free time given to bagging groceries and selling coupons door to door.

The band will board buses
Friday for Dallas and the nationally-televised bowl game on FOX
television. The parade will be
regionally televised in the southwest. They'll perform in both
events next week.

The 77-member band has been preparing for these two special days for about seven months. Two months after the invitation came to perform, the work began with practices, enlisting of chaperones, preparing uniforms, and fundraising.

The hardest part of the preparations was the rehearsals, including local parade performances, said Band Director Jason Bennett. "We participated in four Christmas parades," he said—Niceville, Fort Walton Beach,

Crestview, and Pensacola.

"All the practices" were what piccolo player Abi Hoskins, recalled as being the most difficult part of the trip preparation. "It really takes a lot of time and dedication. You have to realize that your own performance or not showing up to practice affects the

rest of the band," said Abi, a senior.

Although the group is thrilled to be included as one of 20 bands invited, no one knows who sent a letter of recommendation to Cotton Bowl coordinators.

"When I got the invitation in April," said Bennett, "at first I thought it was a joke, so I called them just to check. Once they assured me it wasn't a joke I took the invitation to the (school)

administration. We were all overwhelmed that a marching band program only two years old could receive this honor."

Bowl coordinators did require an application and a video of the band's performance.

The how or why of the invitation is not nearly as consequential as the logistics of getting 77 students from Niceville to Dallas, and to come up with things to do when not performing. Bennett said all accepted band directors were flown to Dallas and given a tour of possible things for the students to do, as well as of the location and order of Cotton Bowl events.

Taking that many students, ranging from grade 6 to grade 12, the 739 miles to Dallas is no small feat.

They'll have 29 adults to keep track of them.

"These kids have gone above and beyond in preparing for this trip," s a i d Christine Ruff, band secretary and mother of drummer Matthew

Ruff. "This is a once-in-a-lifetime experience. These kids have put a lot of sweat and hard work into it all."

In addition, the jazz and symphonic bands will be participating in a competitive musical festival associated with the Cotton Bowl, said Bennett.

The group will be boarding coach buses leaving at 7 a.m. Friday, and will spend the day on the road. They'll return the night of Jan. 2.

While marching and playing for an audience as well as competing is the main reason the band is going to Dallas, it's not the only thing they plan to do.

Five rehearsals, one competition, one parade march (1.5 miles)

and one bowl show would surely be enough to wear out the average teenager. Even so, a fun trip to Six

Dinner & Tournament are also on the schedule.

"I'm really looking forward to the performances and the sightseeing," said senior Sharon Waldron. Though the clarinet

player also said she's excited about performing with the 19 other bands at half-time during the Cotton Bowl on New Year's Day.

Originally the trip was estimated to cost \$50,000, a figure since raised to \$65,000.

"With the cost of gas for two buses and the largest U-Haul we could get, that total went up a bit," said Bennett.

The kids themselves raised \$3,500 in a series of three fundraisers, ranging from bagging groceries to selling coupon books. Another \$2,000 came in by donations. The rest came out of parents' pockets (about \$525 per student).

"I thought bagging groceries was a lot of fun," said Sharon Waldron. "It didn't seem like a chore at all."

Catherine Hannay, mother of

band students Ashley and Thomas Hannay said, "It was a lot of money for parents to put out. But this is a great opportunity for our kids. You think about the money, and you don't."

Niceville will be in the college bowl limelight twice on New Year's Day. Niceville High's Golden Eagles Marching Band will walk in the nationally televised Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, Calif.

Bennett said he's very proud of the Rocky Bayou band's efforts, not only in fundraising but in preparatory practices as well.

"The kids have worked extremely hard, they're very eager for the whole thing," the band director said. "Their patience has been tested, but with every practice they've gotten better."

Although performance may seem to be a logical focal point, Bennett said it's the lessons the kids learn that really count.

"I think they see that through the gifts God has given them he also richly blesses them," Bennett said. "This trip is a blessing—a reward for all their hard work."

Whether the marchers win an award or elicit "ooohs" and "ahhhs" from audience members, it's not adulation that should be a

mark of success.

"If they learn anything, it should be humility," Bennett said. He also hopes each student walks away from the



Joseph's father, Haeyoung Sung, is a minister who preached to 3,000 parishioners in his native Seoul, South Korea, helped by Joseph's mother, Cindy.

The family moved to the United States in 2001. At the time, Joseph spoke not a word of English. He quickly picked up the language from television and school and now speaks accent-free American English.

"I think I speak better English now than Korean," Joseph said, smiling.

When he was 7 and still living in Korea, Joseph first started playing the piano. Then, he said, "I didn't play for about two years. Then some ladies from my church introduced me to Mr. Singleton. I think he's the main teacher in this area. He's a really good teacher."

The Sung family once owned a piano, but they sold it and moved out west. When they returned, there was no piano for Joseph to practice on.

"I lent him my keybo ard," Singleton said. But the lion's share of Joseph's practice takes place in the church before sunrise.

Not that he naturally gravitated toward the piano.

"My parents at first made me play it," he said, laughing. "But in the last couple of years I started getting serious."

Joseph won his first competition in October of last year. In fact, he performed in three competitions and won them all.

"He took the Mozart competition—that's a very stiff competition—and he took the sonata competition last year," Singleton said. Joseph is quick to credit Singleton with his success.

"My teacher picks all my songs," Joseph said. "I don't dare pick my own because he knows better. That's a really challenging piece."

Joseph said the symphony competition was "my first really big competition. I was really nervous that day. I thought I didn't do well. But I played a lot before and after."

Singleton said playing a lot is hardly unusual for Joseph.

"It's rare that you have a student who works that hard," Singleton said. "He's a most diligent worker. He has talent, but he's just a really diligent worker."

While other teenagers are listening to rap and hip-hop music, Joseph leans toward the old masters.

"I like classical," he said.
"That's the only music I like, but I kind of like Christian rock."

He also performs in the Rocky Bayou Christian School band, playing the bassoon. He likes history, particularly American history. "I heard about Abraham Lincoln in Korea and thought he was really interesting," he said. Another love is literature. He likes Longfellow and, he said, "I read Dickens' 'Tale of Two Cities' and really liked it."

Joseph is only 14 and hasn't decided whether to try to make a living with his music or not. He says it's very difficult to do so. "There are a lot of pianists," he said. "I'm going to work a lot harder than I do now. Later on, I'll make a decision."

Does Singleton think his star pupil could earn a living at the piano?

"Oh yeah, for sure. And a good living," he said. "When you're as devoted as he is, you can."







Bowl in Dallas and the associated New Year's parade and music festival.


RBCS bands returned home Jan. 2 with seven first-place trophies.



Traffic crash kills one, injures another

Funeral services are scheduled for 10 a.m. today for a 25-year-old Niceville man killed in a singlevehicle crash early Friday. The car's driver, also from Niceville, remains hospitalized.

Wesley B. Faile, 25, of Niceville, was killed after he was ejected from the car in which he was a passenger during the crash on Highway 285, about two miles north of College Boulevard, about 1:30 a.m. Jan. 11, according to a report by the Florida Highway Patrol.

The driver, Gabriel C. Pineiro, 24, also of Niceville, was seriously injured and taken to Fort Walton Beach Hospital, the FHP said. As of Tuesday morning Pineiro was listed in stable condition, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Faile, a 2000 graduate of Rocky Bayou Christian School, had attended classes at Okaloosa-Walton College and was a sales manager of an electronics store. He was also a writer who had won several poetry contests.

Funeral services for Faile are scheduled at 10 a.m. today at the Niceville Assembly of God, on Highway 85, Niceville. Burial will

be in Pleasant Hill Cemetery in Slocomb, Ala. Heritage Gardens Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

According to the FHP Pineiro was driving a 2003 Infinity G35

northbound on Highway 285 when his vehicle traveled into the grassy east shoulder. The driver tried to steer back onto the road but overcorrected, the FHP said, causing him to lose control of the vehicle.

The car then spun across both the northbound and southbound lanes, the FHP said. It entered the grassy shoulder on the west side of the road, where its right wheels dug into the ground and caused it to overturn and strike several trees, before landing on all four wheels.

Both men were wearing their seat belts at the time of the crash, according to the FHP.

One killed, one hurt in Niceville crash

Wesley B. Faile died when he was ejected from vehicle

NICEVILLE — A man was killed early Friday when the car he was riding in overturned and ejected him.

Wesley B. Faile, 25, of Niceville was a passenger in a 2003 Infiniti that crashed at about 1:30 a.m. He was pronounced dead at the scene, according to a Florida Highway Patrol press release.

Gabriel C. Pineiro, 24, also of Niceville, was driving the car. He was in critical condition at 8 p.m. Friday at Fort Walton Beach Medical Center, hospital officials said.

Pineiro was driving north on State Road 285 near College Boulevard when the car drifted onto the grassy shoulder, according to the FHP. He then overcorrected and lost control of the vehicle.

The car spun counterclockwise across SR 285. The right wheels then dug into the grass on the west side of the road and caused the car to overturn and strike several trees before it landed upright, the FHP release stated.

Both men were wearing seatbelts, according to the FHP.

It was not known if alcohol was involved.





Niceville scholarships cast wider net By Kenneth Books

New scholarships set up by the Niceville City Council through Take Stock in Children could be earned by private-school students using state vouchers, or by home-

schooled students, as well as public-school students, said Program Coordinator Cindy Frazier.

"A private school student under the state voucher program would be considered a public school student," Frazier said. She also said Take Stock in Children considers nomeschooled students to be pubic school students. Homechooled students, too, are considred public-school students, she

Last week, Frazier indicated at private-school and homehooled students were ineligible r the Niceville scholarships, and at only public school students ould be considered.

The city began advertising for applicants this week, seeking city residents "currently enrolled in the 6th grade at an Okaloosa School District middle school, a charter school, a home school program or attending a private school under a state voucher plan," and who meet state criteria.

The city council Feb. 12 voted to hand responsibility for selecting the students to benefit from the Katie Mathews White will to Take Stock for Children, a nonprofit organization headquartered in Fort Lauderdale but with offices in each of Florida's counties.

The organization identifies low-income students of promise in the sixth grade, earmarks a scholarship for them and signs them to a contract agreeing to stay drugand crime-free and to maintain at least a 2.0-or "C"-average. When they finish high school, they receive a "two-plus-two" scholarship, good for two years at a community college and two more at a four-year school.

Florida prepaid scholarships purchased by the organization amount to about \$5,000 in sixth grade, matched by funds from the state tax coffers and accruing interest until needed for college.

According to Gladys Graves, a spokesperson at the Lauderdale office, the 11-year-old Take Stock in Children program has spent \$95 million on scholarships. In Okaloosa County, 99 students have taken part so far without a single dropout, said Kaye McKinley, executive director, who is also deputy schools superintendent.

"If they haven't made it through, it's because they left the state," McKinley said. "I believe the first one is about to graduate from college this year."

Kelly Mattox, who heads the

Jacksonville office, calls Take Stock in Children a "public-private program." She said it is up to the county office whether to extend the scholarships to nonpublic school students. She said the lion's share of revenue the program receives comes from an annual grant by the Florida Legislature, while private gifts such as that made by White make up the balance.

Frazier said the new Niceville scholarships will be presented in addition to any that might have been otherwise earmarked for Niceville children. 'These are in addition to," she said.

The question remains whether White intended the scholarships to go only to public school students or not. Her will makes no such differentiation. In fact, it specifies that "notification must be given to all local Okaloosa County schools."

Students hear virtues of chastity

Christian leader Josh McDowell addresses Niceville audience

Teenagers went to a church to hear about sex, and chastity last Thursday, when Christian leader

and author Josh
McDowell came to
Niceville to talk about
how Christian values
apply to human sexuality.

The teens, most of whom were students from Rocky Bayou Christian Academy, came with some teachers and parents to hear McDowell discuss how

and why Christian moral teachings apply to the romantic lives of teens and adults. McDowell also talked about how he origi-

nally made the leap from being a confirmed atheist to becoming a Christian.

McDowell said that he grew up in rural Michigan, as the son

> of a farmer who was also the town drunk. McDowell grew up filled with shame and hatred for his father, who regularly abused his wife and children.

After leaving home and becoming a university student, McDowell said, he sought to give his life meaning through intellectual

growth and the search for truth, but he had no patience for students and faculty who claimed to

be Christians, even though he envied the apparent love and friendship they seemed to share, and their positive outlook on life; things McDowell had never experienced.

"How could anyone believe such nonsense?" he wondered, thinking that belief in such things as Jesus' miracles or resurrection was incompatible with the intellectual honesty expected of anyone at a university.

Determined to unmask the falsehood of Christianity, McDowell set out on a personal research project that lasted years, and took him to universities, libraries and archeological sites in Europe, Israel, and the Middle East, as well as the United States, seeking evidence to show how Christianity and the Bible were based on myth and legend rather than fact.

The result of his research, he said, was not what he expected or wanted at the time. "One night in a library in England," he said, "I finally admitted what all my research had shown me; that it was all really true—Jesus Christ actually said and did all the things that the Bible said He did."


McDowell, who now lives in Dallas, became a Christian himself, and went on to write a lengthy book called "Evidence That Demands a Verdict," in which he details his research and findings about Christianity and the Bible. He has since written numerous other books, including "More Than a Carpenter," and "Don't Check Your Brains at the Door," and has earned world-wide recognition as an author and speaker.

McDowell's chief criticism of contemporary Christians and churches, he said, is that, "Most Christians can tell you what they believe, but cannot tell you why they believe it." He said people should take the time and make the effort to study and get to the roots

of their beliefs, and to verify for themselves whether those beliefs are, in fact, true. Faith, he said, should not be blind, but based on a willingness to find out the truth and to then live according to it.

Such principles, the evangelist said, also apply to one's moral choices, including the choices teenagers face as they confront their own sexuality. McDowell has written several books for teens, including "Why True Love Waits," and "Right From Wrong," both of which deal with moral and sexual issues.

"There is not one verse in the Bible," McDowell told his audience at Rocky Bayou Baptist Church, Niceville, "that says sex is sinful—only it's misuse." God's purposes for sex, he said, include not only procreation, but the physical expression of love and unity between husband and wife through mutual enjoyment of each other.

The misuse of sex, he said, occurs when people use it to exploit each other as mere playthings, usually leading to disappointment, anger and misery,

along with a host of social probems such as unwanted or abused children, abortions, and the worldwide pandemic of sexually transmitted diseases.

McDowell warned teens and dults not to believe the myth that condoms equal "safe" sex, saying hat research studies have shown hat even among couples who consistently use condoms, unexpected oregnancies occur in nearly 30 percent of such couples within the irst year. In addition to unplanned oregnancy, he said, there are 39 major sexually transmitted disasses spreading throughout the world, including many which are neurable or fatal, or both.

However, he added, sexual norality is not a negative value, out a positive one, and less about voiding disaster than about finding the path to real happiness and

"You shouldn't abstain from sex because sex is bad," he said, "but because sex is so wonderful that it's worth waiting for until you marry someone you truly love."

McDowell said that recent surveys show that happily married Christians report greater satisfaction with their sex lives than other groups of people. "The spiritual dimension to their relationship is what makes it so much better," he said.

"If sexual promiscuity were a path to happiness," he added, "prostitutes would be the happiest people in the world."

Love, McDowell said, is more than just a feeling. "If love were just a feeling, God could not command people to love one another, because no one can make themselves feel anything." Love, he said, is really an action; a deliberate choice people make together, to spend their lives nurturing and protecting each other.

Following McDowell's talk, some of his listeners shared their impressions with a reporter.

"It was a good message," said 14-year-old Brittany Boothe. She said she appreciated McDowell's willingness to speak frankly about sexual issues. "Teens should know what's really going on," she said, "especially about STDs."

Among the parents in the audience was Pat Donahue, a local emergency care physician. Donahue thanked McDowell for his book; "Evidence That Demands a Verdict."

"When I was an undergraduate student," said Donahue, "I had some professors who were very negative about Christianity." McDowell's book, he said, helped him to better understand and defend his own faith. "You helped me survive college as a Christian."



Sansom sees education budget cuts

Lawmaker speaks to Niceville students

Legislative outlook, A-4.

"What's the hardest decision you have to make in the Legislature?" an eighth-grade student at Rocky Bayou Christian School, Niceville, asked the guest speaker in an American history class last Wednesday.

"What not to spend money

on," replied state Rep. Ray Sansom,

the designated Speaker of the Florida House in 2009. The Destin Republican was the classroom guest of educator Robert Grete, RBCS founder.

What not to spend money on will dominate the 60-day 2008 legislative session, which started Tuesday in Tallahassee, Sansom said. The state's \$70 billion budget needs to be slashed by \$3 billion, he told students. "Florida has never experienced a downturn like today," he said, as the slowed economy continues to reduce revenues to state coffers.

Billions in state budget cuts this year and next will take a lot of leadership, he said, and the decisions won't be popular. Some of our nation's most honored leaders—Abraham Lincoln, Martin Luther King

> Jr., Ronald Reagan—were often subject

to criticism and unpopular in polls of their contemporaries because of the decisions they made. Sansom told students.

"To be a good leader you can't strive to be popular,"
Sansom said. "It's easy in politics to follow polls," but public opinion "polls change like the weather." Cutting the state budget will require a lot of backbone and vision by the state leadership, said the law-

maker, whose Fourth District includes Niceville and Valparaiso.

"How do you plan to cut the budget?" another student asked.

"All areas will be cut,"

Sansom replied, including transportation, education, health care and public safety. Legislators, he said, hope to make cuts in overhead and administrative costs, avoiding cuts that would have a direct

impact in classrooms, doctors' offices and road building.

Sansom, the father of three daughters, talked to Rocky Bayou 8th grade students Feb.

27 about leadership, public service, character and politics.

He asked students how their everyday lives are affected by the state Legislature. Getting only vague answers, Sansom asked how many planned to drive when they turned 16—and almost every student's hand shot up. Several bills to be debated in the legislature this spring relate to possible restrictions on youth driving privileges, he said.

Examples: Should under-18 drivers should be allowed to carry friends as passengers? Should cell phone use be banned in teen's cars? What about text messaging and driving?

"How would they enforce that?" one student asked about the bill that would limit passengers to family members when a minor is at the wheel. "That's one of the reasons I don't approve of the bill," the law-maker replied.

"Between March and May I will vote 4,000 times on issues," Sansom told students. He urged students to become interested in issues and making their voices heard on the local, state and national levels,

He related a story from his 20 years in politics, an election race when he had hired a political consultant, which he defined as someone you pay to tell you something you already know. "What he said was, don't focus on issues that affect 18- to 25-year-olds." Instead, the consultant advised a focus on the 45-

plus age group—"those who vote."

Sansom told the RBCS eighth graders that, after turning 18, "if you want your voice to be heard, go vote."

Sansom also challenged students to listen to political commercials in this year's presidential race. They won't hear talk about skateboard or paintball parks, driving privileges, getting into college or getting a job out of high school, he said. Instead, expect to hear about Social Security, health care, retirement issues, the war in Iraq and the economy.

"Every person has a purpose in life," Sansom told students, and "the sooner you find it the happier you will be." Whether in politics, teaching school or volunteering, he said he strongly believes in giving back to one's community.

Raised in a strong Christian family, he was taught "we're not here to receive, we're here to give." Other than voting, Sansom said his parents were not really involved in public issues. He prayed about his life goals as a college student before deciding to enter public service as an elected official.

"Mom didn't actually like me to be in politics," he said.

Sansom stressed the importance of honesty and character in politics, where "it can be hard sometimes to tell people the truth." Whether people tell him the truth about subjects like the budget, will determine whether he believes that person in the future, he said.

While people who have made bad decisions in the past should always be allowed to redeem themselves, their "pattern of behavior becomes their character," he said. "Without good character you can't be a good leader."

During a question-andanswer session, Sansom discovered some things on the students' minds.

Q: Which presidential candidates have you met?

A: Huckabee, Giuliani, but not Obama or McCain.

Q: Who will you vote for for president?

A: McCain or whoever the Republican candidate is.

Q: Who did you vote for in the (Jan. 29 presidential preference) primary?

A: Huckabee.

Q: Has your Christian faith affected your decision to run for office?

A: Yes. The public has embraced the idea that candidates have a faith. However they don't want elected candidates who then say one faith is better than others. "Whatever your faith is, you should live it."

Q: What do you think about the proposed specialty license tag honoring "Confederate heritage" (a bill sponsored by state Rep. Don Brown, a DeFuniak Springs Republican)?

A: "That would be too controversial and very divisive," Sansom said. "I don't think it will pass."

Grete said that throughout his 30 years as an educator, he has invited public and business officials to come into his history, government and economics classes to talk to his students.

In addition to hosting Sansom several times, RBCS students have also heard from state senators Don Gaetz (R-Niceville) and Durell Peaden (R-Crestview), and former Dist. 1 Congressman Joe Scarborough, among others.

Sansom said he is a frequent guest in school classrooms in the Panhandle, although with less emphasis on his religious beliefs in public school settings. From staff reports



ARY ESTHER — Lorann Hollis took a leap of faith when she ordered a class ring last year for her son.

Matthew, 26, was diagnosed with Asperger's Syndrome when he was 14. He was told he'd never drive a car, let alone graduate from college.

He is on track to do both.

"It's not just us. We have to give the Lord the glory for what he's done for us," Lorann said.

Matthew will graduate next month

with a bachelor of science degree in interdisciplinary history and communication broadcasting from Pensacola Christian College.

"Well, I'm a little excited," he said.
"Well, sometimes I am."

Upon graduating from Rocky Bayou Christian School, Matthew entered college in 2001.

After Lorann taught him to do laundry, Matthew stayed in the dorms for most of the past six years. But his parents have been by his side every step of the way.

They traveled to the campus every weekend, studied his lesson outlines and drove him to night classes.

"I was just shepherding him and making sure he would keep up with his studies," said Matthew's father, Michael.

Although Matthew is highly functional on the autism spectrum, he has difficulty with social interactions, understanding body language and nuances of speech.

Questions have to be reworded or refined for him. Matthew excels at the concrete rules of English grammar, foreign languages and math. But the subtleties in subjects like literature are harder for him to comprehend.

"He sees everything black and white," Michael said.

Matthew also has a keen eye for detail and loves maps. Every so often, he goes to bookstores and inventories their map collections, noting the edition and publisher.

In his room, Matthew has a magazine rack filled with maps from around the United States. He can easily outline the quickest route to take on road trips almost anywhere.

Matthew's favorite map to study is Alabama because that's where he was born, he said. He's translated parts of the state's map into Latin.

Lorann and Michael readily admit it hasn't been an easy road to travel. At one time last August, the family thought about pulling Matthew out of school.

But with encouragement from the school's president and vice president, they decided to persevere.

The past few months have been bittersweet. While Matthew is preparing to graduate, their 22-year-old son Jonathan, who is severely autistic, was placed in a group home a few weeks ago.

Jonathan can barely speak and duct tape lines the

walls of the Hollises' home where he has kicked with the heel of his shoe.

"He's not dumb. He just functions behavioral-wise as a child in a sense," Lorann said

With the challenges presented by their sons' disabilities, the past 20 years have been strenuous at times, the couple say. They have to plan every day months in advance and they haven't had a vacation in about 15 years.

"We live a different lifestyle than normal people do," Michael said. "Our whole lives have been pretty muchscheduled around them. We wouldn't just get up and say we're going out to eat tonight."

"I've had my crying moments," Lorann added.

Said Michael: "A lot of couples would have ended in divorce or separation when they have kids like this."

But the pair said they never regretted the time they've invested, adding that teamwork and faith has gotten them through.

Although people sympathize, Michael said until you've lived something, you don't really understand.

"It's the hard things in life that really define who we are," he said.

Lorann said it's hard, but it does get better over the years. But now the couple aren't quite sure what to do.

Matthew is working at his first job at the commissary at Hurlburt Field, which he said, "I think I've enjoyed it."

Eventually, he'd like to go back to school and get a library science degree.

The Hollises will be ready when that challenge presents itself, but they say they need to take a breath.

"Mom and dad need a break for a while," Michael said.

Area schools top 20 Knowledge Masters NHS 4th in state; Lewis third

Five area schools participated in the last Knowledge Masters Open of the school year for grades seven through 12, and placed in the top 20 in the state.

At the high school level (grades 10-12), Niceville High's 11-member team finished fourth in the state with an international ranking of 86 and Rocky Bayou Christian Academy's nine-member team finished 18th in the state with an international ranking of 390. A total of 30 Sunshine State high school teams participated in the open on April 23. There

were 703 schools competing internationally.

At the middle school level (grades seven and eight), Destin Middle School's eight-member team finished second in the state and had an international ranking of 61. Lewis Middle School had nine team members and finished third statewide and 109th internationally. Ruckel Middle School, with seven team members, came in at sixth place statewide and 161 internationally. Rocky Bayou Christian School's middle school team of 16 members finished 12th in the state and placed 379 out of 753 schools internationally.

Knowledge Masters is a

semiannual computer-based academic competition which allows students to compete without leaving their own school.

At the secondary level (middle through high school) the teams are required to quickly and accurately answer a series of 200 multiple-choice questions in 15 subject areas, with a time limit of 29 seconds per question. The quicker a team answers the question, the more points it can Communication among team members is encouraged though answers must be given without the help of coaches or audience members.

nd, 3, all smiles despite his life-threatening battle

For most little boys, sleeping through the night is a normal thing and most kids paint pictures in art class to hang on the walls or refrigerator. But that isn't the case with either 3year-old Joel Strickland or the Special Services class of Rocky Bayou Christian School.

Joel has a disease that will take his life if treatment is not received. The seventh and eighth grade Special Services class created pictures that were sent to an auction in Texas whose profits will go to the Cystinosis Research Network to help find a cure for Joel's disease.

"They were quiet and thoughtful," said Ruth Crowe. teacher of the class. "They really went at it wholeheartedly. I was so pleased that they were so willing to do it."

Each of the seven students in the class drew a picture using colored pencils and a large mat with a black or white side. The students completed the pictures in one day. Though the students at RBCS had never met Joel, they were inspired after hearing from Joel's paternal grandmother, Beverly Foster. One of the stu-

dents, Cammie, even drew a picture of Joel for the fundrais-

According to "Natalie's Wish," a non-profit group battling cystinosis, the inherited disease is a buildup of cystine, a nonessential amino acid. When too much of the amino acid gets into the cells, it has no way to get out. Consequently, when cystine levels are too high the cystine begins to crystallize and slowly destroy the body.

The most common organs where the process starts are the kidneys, liver, eyes and brain. Before the progression of

today's technology, children diagnosed with the disease were lucky to live to age 10.

People with cystinosis must take the medication Cystagon every six hours. Kids with this disease, just like Joel, don't know what it is to sleep through the night.

For Joel, even getting diagnosed with the disease was a huge process. Unlike his big brother, Jonah, who is 5, Joel didn't develop like a normal baby. His mother, Dawn Strickland, kept noticing abnormalities.

"He would throw up all the time and he couldn't do any-

thing," she said. "He would just lie there on the couch. I'd already had another child (Jonah) and I could tell that something was wrong."

Finally, after months of tests, numerous doctors, tears and prayers the Stricklands were told that Joel had cystinosis. Since then, life has not been easy, but the Stricklands have hope. As the awareness for cystinosis grows so does the chance for finding a cure.

Today, only 500 people in the United States, mostly children, have cystinosis. Since the disease is so rare, there are not



This hand crafted instrument is made of Purple Heart and Sugar Maple with a heart shaped bridge carved out of African Paduk. The unique wood inlay banding around the sugar maple sides was a gift from one craftsman to another and has not been available for over 20 years. This Lyre, which harkens back to the time of King David, is appropriately named the "Psalm 108 Lyre" after the first two verses of that Psalm: "My heart is steadfast, O God; I will sing and make music with all my soul. Awake, harp and lyre! I will awaken the dawn." These verses are written inside the lyre as part of the maker's mark.

The instrument has eleven strings and is tuned with two pentatonic octaves, that is a 5 note scale of -C, D, F, G, A with an extra C at the top. Value: \$1000

Carrying the Load

Kaim developing into workhorse for Knights

NICEVILLE — Rocky Bayou Christian running back James Kaim had just ran for a team-high 138 yards on 26 carries and had been responsible for the Knights' lone offensive touchdown in a 21-7 loss to Maclay when coach John Reaves approached the senior about taking on an increased workload.

"I just told him he better start hydrating on Tuesday instead of Wednesday," Reaves said. "We're going to put the ball in hands and see what happens." when I told them to do something. It was done.

"Now they might not know exactly how to get in a threepoint stance, but when I say Go to coach' or 'Come to me', they don't walk and they don't jog-they sprint there."

Niceville's John Cox already has won awards for his work

NICEVILLE — As the news media moves headlong into the digital era, which some say will cause the death of print journalism, John Cox says he's "old school."

An old-fashioned reporter who loves to dig and rewrite, and rewrite again, Cox believes "people will always want to read good stories."

With that philosophy, the former Rocky Bayou Christian School student is quickly blazing a trail for himself in the world of journalism.

Cox, 23, who graduated from University of Florida on Sunday, has won a host of prestigious journalism awards for his storytelling abilities.

Most recently, he won first place in In-Depth Writing in the Hearst Journalism Awards and was named the South Florida Society of Pro- psychology and even toying fessional Journalists' student with math - "I kind of ran out journalist of the year.

He'll fly to San Francisco next month to compete against other Hearst winners for additional honors.

"It just fit like a glove," Nan said. "He just always loved to write and he's also very competitive."

Cox took a standard reporting class at UF and was hooked.

"They probably should have told me how much everyone (in newspapers) gets paid," he joked.

From there, he began freelancing for university and other publications.

His first big story came from a tip from someone in UF's administration that the school was switching from Coke to Pepsi products. He was the first one to break the story statewide.

Four years later, Cox said that's the only story he's ever broken. He said he prefers to write longer pieces and series, such as a story he wrote about a bipolar student who almost killed himself and a series on gambling.

"That got some attention." he said.

But the story that garnered

the most attention - and the Hearst award — was a piece Cox did on the murder of a UF student on New Year's Day 2004.

"I just pursued it to death," he said. "It just kind of played out as a crime novel."

Cox continues to pursue stories doggedly, hungry to find something that someone's missed.

publications such as the Miami Herald and UF's alumni magazine, for which he's now working on a piece about how state budget cuts are affecting the school.

He's also about 25,000 words into a fictionalized crime novel based on real events.

"I think in a perfect world I would do a nonfiction book." he said. "I definitely plan on working for a newspaper for a couple of years."

With a side concentration in business, Cox observes that newspapers have gotten "spoiled."

Across the nation, newsroom layoffs are occurring as advertising revenue falls and a business that once boasted 25 percent profit margins have fallen to 18 percent, he

But Cox fears the cuts could be detrimental to papers down the road.

"If you start taking away quality, people will quit read-Currently, he freelances for ingit," he said. "There are just not enough reporters to cover the great stories."

And Cox's main objective is to continue to do that

"I think journalism just suits me," he said.

"They always do such a wonderful job for me," she said. "I love having them come. They're full of fun but a big help and they really act as if it's a joy for them to do it."



RBCS to take to gridiron in '08

Come September 2008, there will be a new game in town.

Rocky Bayou Christian School got along without a football team for the first 34 years of its existence. But the school will field a team next fall.

"It's a long time off," said the school's new athletic director, John Reaves, who will coach the team. "As of right now, we have our spring practice scheduled for May 12 to 23. We may try to get a spring game with somebody."

Reaves, 42, who hails from Mississippi, coached several scholastic teams in his home state before moving to Florida. He promises a unique offense that may cross up defenders.

"If we can hold them up for about one second, the system I'm installing can be kind of tricky," he said. "It's a pretty neat offense. It's very versatile and it's tough to defend because no one has defended it in 30 years."

Reaves said several East Coast school use an offense similar to the one he has planned. They include Port St. Lucie, Apopka and Titusville.

Part of the team's offensive strategy will be to keep the ball on the ground as much as possible.

"If I can get away with not throwing the football, I'm not going to throw the football," Reaves said, with an eye toward killing the clock. "It's very demoralizing not to be able to move the football, to be on defense the whole game. have already expressed interest in playing for the team, whose inception was announced at last week's pep rally.

"One is a real good-looking kid," he said. "He played some Little League football. He's about 6-2 or 6-3, 205 pounds. I've got him in a weightlifting class already."

Reaves, who teaches weightlifting, said size may be the team's Achilles heel.

"That's going to be our weakness," he said. "We don't have any linemen. They're not big. I understand we have some speed."

Another problem is, just where will the team play? Reaves said he has several schools in mind whose fields he may be able to borrow. Niceville High School, however, is not one of them, having turned him down.

Rocky Bayou may have to

create its own field.
"It would take some rear-

ranging of the current field structure," Reaves said. "I don't know if we'll go there or try something else."

Reaves may face another problem next fall—too many bodies and too few uniforms.

"I go out and sit with (potential players), talk to them. Word of mouth is a very strong motivator," he said. "These kids have been ready for this for a long time. I think I'll probably have to cut kids. We're buying varsity uniforms for only 36 kids."

While some schools and coaches become obsessed with the football team, Reaves said the Rocky Bayou team will be just one component of the school's overall mission.

"We want to offer our students the ability to develop with the knowledge, character and skills they need to become competent servants of Christ," he said. "Adding football is a complement to the overall mission of our school."
