

Dear Parents,

I hope you are having a wonderful summer! We are progressing in our preparation for the start of the school year. To date, 619 students are registered for this fall. We praise God for His continued blessing on our school, and rejoice that so many people are opting to send their children to RBCS!

As you may already know, our RBCS Annual Fund is a program of voluntary giving supported by parents, grandparents, and friends of RBCS to aid us in our mission to provide a high quality, Christ-centered, affordable educational program. The Annual Fund is designed to supplement the difference between the actual costs our school incurs in its mission, and the tuition and bus fees we charge to parents. This past academic year \$16,542.55 was given to the Annual Fund by 102 families. Those gifts are greatly appreciated and have enabled us to make significant progress toward our goals of retiring long-term debt and setting aside money for the materials needed to furnish our new Academy building.

Construction continues on our new building which will house our library, computer lab, science lab, music room, Discovery therapy rooms, and Academy classrooms. With the volume of rain we have experienced it is doubtful that the new building will be completed by August 24th. Please continue to pray for steady progress toward its completion.

This year's Annual Fund will be directed toward the same goals — continuing to retire all long-term debt and purchasing the equipment needed to furnish our new facility. Additionally, we will be needing funds to purchase additional vehicles to transport our growing student body. Our goal for the Annual Fund this year is \$25,000. If only 250 families would commit \$10 per month, or if only 100 families would commit \$25 per month, our goal would be easily attainable. Just think what we could do if each of the 400 families of students enrolled would contribute to the Annual Fund! Please pray about your part in this. Enclosed is a pledge card. If you desire to participate in RBCS's efforts to raise up godly, well-equipped young leaders, please fill out the enclosed pledge card, and return it to us along with your gift.

We are looking forward to a great year! Please pray for our administrators, our teachers, and our students as we start a new year. May God be glorified in all that we do! God bless you.

Dear Kindergarten Parents,

This is a letter to notify you of a few items of general interest at the beginning of this new school year.

General Information: Please label all lunchboxes inside and out with a permanent marker or fingernail polish. Label all sweaters, jackets, and school bags. (Note: The boxes for your child's belongings are 8" x 10".) Your child's lunchbox, coat, reading book, and papers must all fit into this small box. Please give all notes for bus changes, checks, medication schedules, etc., to the bus driver, rather than to your child.

Dress: No specific dress codes apply on a kindergarten level. Children should be dressed neatly and comfortably. Shorts are permissible. It would better help teachers to monitor restrooms if clothing is such that it fosters independent habits. Please keep in mind that the children go outside regularly for recess, even on cold days. Therefore, they should be dressed appropriately. Wearing of mittens is not generally advised because they can be easily misplaced. All outerwear should be labeled with your child's first name and last initial. This will facilitate easier location of lost articles.

Lunch: Full-day students need to bring a sack lunch. Children are required to drink the milk provided by RBCS unless you give us a note to the contrary. It has been our experience that most 3 year olds do not eat much. Any leftover food will be sent home. If this becomes a regular habit, you may wish to reduce the size of the lunch. Do not send anything to be heated. Please limit the amount of sugar in your child's lunch. Large quantities of sugar affect your child's behavior and his academic performance.

Sickness: Please do not send a child to school with a fever or any other signs of illness. (A good guideline is to wait until there has been no sign of fever for a 24 hour period.) Medication will be administered if there is a written note with explicit instructions. Please send it with the bus driver rather than with your child or in his lunchbox. Your cooperation will help to insure safety, thus possibly preventing an accidental overdose by an inquisitive youngster.

Stop Problems Early: If at any time you have questions about anything regarding your child, please call his or her teacher after 1:00 p.m. at 678-2885. We may not perceive a problem in the same way because we have different bits of information; we must communicate.

Room Mother: Each class would like one parent to volunteer to be a room mother. Would you be available to take this responsibility? It would involve telephone calling of other parents when we need help with various projects. Please let your child's teacher know if you can assist in this way.

Notes from Home: Please give any bus changes, checks, medication schedules, or other important notes to the bus driver. This will insure that we receive communications from home.

Birthdays: It is permissible to send cookies or cupcakes on your child's birthday, but please notify the school in advance. These items may be sent with the bus driver.

Toys: Please do not permit any toys, pencils, pens, etc., to be brought from home.

Books: A story book may be brought for "storytime." These should be short, taking no longer than five minutes to read. Since the RBCS emphasis is to "lift up the Lord," we would prefer that stories related to Halloween, Santa Claus, Easter bunnies, etc., not be brought.

Homework Assignments: Monday through Thursday, K4 and K5 kindergartners will have a reading assignment. These should not require more than a 15-30 minute practice period. Cooperation in this greatly enhances the prospects of a fruitful academic year for your child.

Programs: Kindergarteners present two programs during the school year. One is held at Thanksgiving. A second is presented in May. Every child participates. More specifics will be issued at the appropriate time.

Report Cards: Children receive report cards on a quarterly basis (10 week grading periods). In the meantime, if your child is having any particular problems, you will be contacted by the teacher or the supervisor.

Supplies: If your child is a full day student and is in the K3 or K4 program, please send a mat for nap-time labeled with his or her name in permanent ink. We request that each student bring a box of Kleenex. All K3 and K4A students need to bring an extra change of clothes to leave at the school.

Snacks: In order to provide a nutritious snack for our children, we have used RBCS resources to purchase orange juice for snack time. We are asking those parents who would like to help us provide a snack to accompany the juice to fill in and return the form below. We prefer the assorted crackers (graham, saltines, cheese, wheat, etc.).

Dear RBCS Lower Elementary Parents,

The purpose of this letter is to explain to you the rationale for, and the nature of, our "tally system" used in the Lower Elementary Department to help build Christian character in our children. First, let me share with you some thoughts concerning virtue as spoken of in the Scriptures. Then I'll explain how we want to use the tally system to develop it in our children.

The Scripture exhorts us as Christians to be possessors of virtue.

Simon Peter, a servant and an apostle of Jesus Christ, to them that have obtained like precious faith with us through the righteousness of God and our Savior Jesus Christ: Grace and peace be multiplied unto you through the knowledge of God, and of Jesus our Lord, according as his divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness, through the knowledge of him that hath called us to glory and virtue: Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust. And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge; And to knowledge temperance; and to temperance patience; and to patience godliness; And to godliness brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness For if these things be in you, and charity. abound, they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. But he that lacketh these things is blind, and cannot see afar off, and hath forgotten that he was purged from his old sins. Wherefore the rather, brethren, give diligence to make your calling and election sure; for if ye do these things, ye shall never fall. 2 Peter 1:1-10

Biblical virtue can be described as all those things pertaining to godliness or godly character. According to Webster's 1828 Dictionary, virtue is moral excellence, right thinking and action, goodness, or morality. These distinctives can be called marks of character. The character of an individual is a summation of those virtues which distinguish one individual from another. Without positive virtues,

- 1. A list of possible <u>black</u> tallies, referred to as the Walk in the Spirit Chart. You may keep this chart at home for your own reference.
- 2. Also attached you will find a sheet titled Explanation of $\underline{\text{Red}}$ Reward Tallies.

This is the information you need concerning spankings. If a student receives 5 remorse (black) tallies for TK-taking (stealing), L-lying, ID-intentional disobedience, IS- insolence, or E-evil doings and speakings, the student will be spanked at school. If a student receives 5 remorse (black) tallies for other offenses we feel the student is out of control and should be chastised. We ask, in such cases, that you as the parent handle the chastisement at home in any way you see fit.

If your student has 10 or more remorse tallies in one week, you will be notified by letter. If a student receives 100 remorse tallies within a quarter (45 days) the student will be suspended from school for a period of time determined by myself and the parent involved. If you have any question concerning this letter or the tally system, please feel free to call me. Please fill out and return the attached form so that we may know you have received this important communication.

IMPORTANT INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Each child must score the initial of the tally on his paper foot at the time of rebuke.
- 2. At the end of each day, the homeroom teacher will make a record of each child's tallies and send the foot home with the child.
- 3. A new, "clean" foot will be used each day for every child.
- 4. One tally is scored for each offense except for the initials <u>ID</u> (Intentional Disobedience), <u>L</u> (Lying), <u>E</u> (Evil Doings and Speakings), <u>I</u> (Insolence), and <u>TK</u> (Taking), which are to immediately receive five tallies for each offense.
- 5. The use of the rod for five tallies, other than those mentioned in #4, should be administered by the parent. The offenses listed in point #4 will be dealt with by the teacher at school.







Dear RBCS Parents of Kindergarten, Lower Elementary, and Talent Development Students,

We need your assistance to insure your child safely departs school. When you registered your child at RBCS, you listed the person(s), other than a parent, having permission to pick up your child. Anyone not listed will be denied the right to pick up a child from the RBCS campus. To carry out your wishes, we have designed protective procedures.

Except as explained below, RBCS teachers <u>may not release</u> a student to anyone, <u>including parents</u>, from their classroom door. All student pickups are to be done through an RBCS office. Authorized pickup persons must first go to the Upper Building (Bookstore) office to sign the child out on the "student sign in/sign out sheet." You may be asked for <u>identification</u> if the person behind the desk does not know you by sight.

After ascertaining that the person is an authorized pickup person, the receptionist will issue and initial a Pick Up Pass.

The Pick Up Pass is to be taken to the correct office secretary (the Kindergarten Office for a Kindergartener, the Lower Elementary Office for grades 01-05 and the Talent Development Office in the Gym for Talent Development students).

However, for elementary grades 5A (teacher, Mrs. Mays) and 06 (teacher, Mr. Isaac) - located in the Upper (bookstore) building - and the two modular units outside the elementary building which house grades 06 (teacher, Mr. Lowrey) and grade 6A (teacher, Mrs. Babbitt) - the Pick Up Pass is to be presented at the classroom door.

When a Pick Up Pass is presented at the correct office, the office secretary will receive the Pass, initial it, and present it to the correct teacher or teacher assistant. The teacher/assistant will then help the child gather up his books, assignments, sweater or coat, etc., and either the

Because this is a time-consuming procedure, it would be wise to send a morning note to your child's teacher letting her/him know that your child will be picked up early - at what time and by whom. Early notification will alert the teacher to help your child be ready to go. When you need to pick up your child, make sure you allow yourself extra time to follow these procedures. Start early!

Please cooperate with our efforts to protect your child in this dangerous age in which we live. Even though many of you are well-known to the staff and have done things more conveniently in the past, we ask that you please be understanding of our need for care and follow the procedures. This will be an easy procedure to follow and will be for the safety and well-being of our students. Thank you for your help!



Clinton's call to arms wins few supporters

President Clinton's efforts to bolster support for a massive armed invasion of Haiti has won a few local supporters - but not many. And most of those support the plan only with reservations.

Steve Kennedy, post commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 10479 near Hurlburt

Field, is among the few who said he sees the need for a military invasion of the Caribbean island nation to restore the presidency of Jean-Bertrand Aristide.

"I'm all for it," the Vietnam veteran said. "It is too close to our letting Castro get away

there. I'm not all that in favor of Clinton, but it's not just him (who favors military action)."

Other local residents in a random sampling didn't favor the plan.

"I think it is the stupidest thing I've ever heard of in my life, but absolutely typical of this man," said Howard Dimmig, who retired in 1988 as chief scientist of the then-Armament Division at Eglin Air Force Base.

"The (Thursday night) speech was just a bunch of political excuses," Dimmig said. "It is not, in my opinion, a problem for the United States. People left Haiti in boats, and they should have been returned to where they belong, where they started

from. They don't threaten us in any way, shape or manner."

He considers a plan to invade to be "100 percent politics" and the timing - just before November elections - to be suspiciously "interesting."

Politicians are stepping carefully through the unpopular political mine field.

"For three years we have tried every other means short of intervention, including a tough embargo and political and diplomatic isolation." U.S. Sen. Bob Graham (D) said Thursday. "They have not worked. There is no indication they will."

"We now face a choice: abandon the principle of democracy in our hemisphere or intervene," Graham said. "Our national interest makes the second option necessarv."

U.S. Sen. Connie Mack (R) favors an invasion of Haiti, but is still critical of Clinton's foreign policy, saying the president lacks credibility after backing down from previous threats.

"Ultimately, Floridians will continue to live with the threat of an immigration crisis on our shores until democracy and freedom are restored in Haiti," Mack said. "If the president decides to use the military to restore democracy in Haiti ... there must be a wellconceived military plan to move in, get the job done, and get out."

The national Libertarian Party issued a statement calling the plan "unwise, unnecessary and unconstitutional."

U.S. Rep. Earl Hutto (D), the retiring representative from Florida's District 1, expressed mixed emotions on Friday.

"... From a national standpoint, I cannot justify in my mind the likely loss of American lives that

may result from invading Haiti," Hutto said. "Therefore, I cannot support an invasion into Haiti without a debate and vote by Congress to approve it.

"We must continue to seek out other solutions to the situation in Haiti," Hutto said. "In the event the invasion does take place without congressional approval, I would join all Americans in standing behind our nation's military personnel."

Nearly everyone stands firmly behind military forces.

It's the plan that has folks out-

raged.

"I expect to see an extremely professional military do an extremely professional job that will be over very rapidly," said J.V.O. Weaver of Niceville, who retired as a lieutenant colonel in special operations at Hurlburt Field in May.

"There will be casualties," Weaver said. "It's not worth the life of one U.S. serviceman."

He considers Thursday night's speech absurd and the planned invasion nothing more than a political maneuver.

"People are undergoing human rights violations all over the world," Weaver said.

Clinton cited both Haiti and Cuba as non-democratic nations in the Caribbean, Weaver said. "Does that mean we're going to invade Cuba next?"

Bob Grete, a retired lieutenant colonel who now operates Rocky Bayou Christian School in Niceville, takes issue with the mass invasion method in particular.

The West Point graduate spent most of his last eight years in the

Air Force at Hurlburt Field and he believes a surgical strike by elite forces would be more effec-

"I hate to say it, because it goes against governmental policy, but I think going into a situation like this is absolutely stupid," Grete said. "To mow down a bunch of people just to get the dictator is stupid. It should be a Special Ops type of operation. We should go directly for the decision-makers. I was in Special Ops, so I know it can be done."

Please take the time to look over the information and encourage your children to sell. Again this year, we will be selling DaySpring cards. The quality of the cards is excellent and the content of the cards is genuinely Christian.

As a husband and father of four, I realize how valuable your time is, and I am aware that fundraising campaigns are inconvenient. Many families have had success by simply carrying the Christmas card catalogs with them to their workplaces, to the places that they do business, and to church friends.

Some practical details involving the administration of this project are as follows:

You will not need to collect sales tax on the card orders. 1)

id you get to read the Daily News editorial page on Labor Day? Suzanne Fields wrote about the flak responsible parents were getting from the People for the American Way (PAW) (who aren't). 

We ask for your prayers that we will continue to teach His ways and mold His children by His precepts, to walk in the path He has prepared for them.



- Course Objectives: The chief objective of choir is for each member individually, and the group collectively, to bring glory to God through all of our activities (I Cor. 10:31). We will strive for this goal by raising our voices "to the Lord" (Eph. 5:19), and giving the best that we have for Him (Col. 3:23). Our secondary goal is to learn more about music through the art of choral singing, and to be prepared to participate in choirs as a lifetime activity.
- Course Requirements: As a student in choir, you are required to:
 *Be in your seat with your music, ready to sing at the start
 of class.
 - *Have a pencil for every rehearsal and use it to mark the music.
 - *Use proper posture when singing whether you are sitting or standing.
 - *Be attentive at all times whether you are singing or not. Choir is a team activity and students in each section should know how other sections relate to theirs.
 - *Always be involved either in singing or listening.
 - *Be good stewards of the music used. Books, folders, or music that are lost or damaged beyond reasonable use will need to be replaced by that student.
 - *Be attentive and give your best during warm-up and sightsinging exercises. This is an important part of drir for you to work on your vocal abilities.
 - *Each week memorize a Bible verse about music.
 - *Memorize the music for all performances, unless otherwise specified.
 - *Be good stewards of the chapel building.
 - *Attend all performances. Students missing a performance because of an excused absence will be given an alternate assignment to complete. Unexcused absences from a performance will result in the removal of the student from choir.
 - *Wear concert attire for all performances, unless otherwise stated by the director for a specific performance. Purchase of needed outfits will be the responsibility of each student. A decision will be made by a committee made up of parents, students, and the director to decide specific outfits to be worn.

Unacceptable Behaviors: Students will not:

- *Study for tests, read books, or do homework for other classes during choir. As stated above, you are to either be singing or listening.
- *Talk and/or fool around in choir. This includes before and after rehearsal.
- *Laugh at or be sarcastic toward another student or section when they sing. We are to work together and encourage one another.

Grading:

25% Participation/Effort

25% Attention/Behavior

20% Memorization

20% Homework/Tests/Quizzes

10% Punctuality

Discipline: If a student fails to follow the requirements, the director will <u>remind</u> him/her of the proper behavior. If the behavior continues, a warning will be given. If the student needs to be spoken to again that day, he/she will receive a 2% grade reduction and will be assigned detention with the director. Continued disrespect will result in the student being removed from class for that period. If a student needs to be removed from class a second time, a conference will be scheduled with the parents, and the student will receive a one week suspension from choir. A student that is asked to leave choir a third time for his/her behavior will be removed from choir.

Again, a reminder: If a student skips a performance without an excused absence, he/she will be removed from choir.

Dear RBCS Lower Elementary Parents,

I want to say thank you for helping us have such a nice looking student body. About 95% of our parents are doing an outstanding job in following the dress code guidelines. Our students look neat and I believe that has a positive effect on academic areas also. Again, thank you!

In adapting the details of the high school dress code to lower elementary, I believe I have neglected to delete a few details which seem inappropriate to lower elementary children. I apologize for this. Please especially note the changes in wording on this attached, revised dress code: in paragraph 1.a.1. and paragraph 1.b.1. Also, paragraph 4 from the previous dress code has been deleted.

Please understand that we have tried to write a very <u>positive</u> dress code that does not rely simply on "Thou shalt nots." Please send your student in the attire stated in the dress code. Some students are coming dressed in clothing which "skirts the borders." Some children come dressed as if parents do not have a copy of or have not read the dress code.

When a violation of the dress code takes place, most students in a class observe that violation but have no knowledge that parents are being contacted about that violation. So, then the next day we have 3 or 4 of the same dress code violation because the students' reasoning is, "Well, Johnny (or Mary) wore one yesterday."

In the same vein, we have had parents visit the school who are diligent to follow the dress code. But, while on campus they will see a dress code violation and say, "Well, if so and so can wear that item of clothing, then why can't my child?" That parent, of course, would have no knowledge of whether we have dealt with that dress code violation that day or not.

We have chosen certain places to draw a line. It is not a sacred line by any means. It is not that there is always something immodest or immoral about some of these items of clothing, but lines have been drawn in order to maintain a higher standard of dress in our student body.

Please don't "skirt the borders." Avoid letting your child wear items that may be considered a T-shirt, that may be considered a sleeveless blouse, or a shirt that obviously does not have a collar. It should be apparent that athletic attire and beach attire are not appropriate for school. Please, let everyone see that, without a doubt, your child is "In dress code!"

DRESS STANDARD FOR RBCS LOWER ELEMENTARY STUDENTS AY 1994-95 REVISED OCTOBER 3, 1994

The RBCS Guidelines for Student Behavior details the standards for behavior that RBCS desires students to adhere to as they mature toward the image of Christ. While only regenerate individuals can truly be maturing toward the image of Christ, there must be some external standards of behavior that apply to all students. The RBCS Guidelines for Student Behavior gives the philosophy of the dress standards. The purpose of this Dress Standard is to provide specific dress guidelines applicable to students in the Lower Elementary (LE) Department. The following specifics are provided to answer most of the questions on which students have typically sought guidance. Students who cheerfully and submissively groom within the following standard will be promoting the peaceful student environment we all desire at RBCS. Final authority for questions in this area at the Niceville Campus will be Mrs. Grete and at the Ft. Walton Campus Mrs. Kidd.

- 1. Students must dress modestly (1 Tim 2:9; Gal 5:19), with an appropriate distinction between the boys and the girls. (Deut 22:5; 1 Cor 11:14-16)
 - a. Girls 05-6A will wear dresses, skirts, slacks, jeans, or culottes. Girls 01-4A will wear dresses, skirts, slacks, jeans, culottes or knee length shorts.
 - 1. The hemline or any slit shall not come above the knee when the girl is sitting or standing. If culottes are worn, they must look like a skirt, not long shorts. Girls' slacks shall be feminine and loose fitting. Color Conservative solids, plaids, and prints. Style Dressy stirrup pants, docker style, casual slacks. If slacks, shorts, etc., have belt loops, belts must be worn. If they do not have belt loops, it is not necessary for belts to be worn.
 - 2. Shoulders shall be covered at all times. Open back or low neck blouses or dresses are inappropriate as are sleeveless shirts, sweaters, or dresses. Halter tops, tube tops and any blouse that leaves any part of the midriff bare are also inappropriate.
 - Blouses and/or sweaters: Color Conservative colors. Note: Shirts of cotton T-shirt material must have collars. Any writing is limited to appropriate personal monogram, your school name or logo. These writings must be limited to the pocket area of the shirt. Oversized and sloppy styles will not be tolerated.
 - b. **Boys 05-6A** will wear slacks or jeans and shirts with a collar. **Boys 01-4A** will wear slacks, jeans, or knee length shorts and shirts with a collar.
 - 1. **Boys**' slacks, jeans, or shorts must be a solid color such as khaki, black, blue, gray, brown, or conservative plaids. If slacks, jeans or shorts have belt loops, belts must be worn. If slacks, shorts or jeans have no belt loops because the waist is fitted or elastic, belts do not have to be worn. Slacks that are torn, faded, oversized or sloppy will not be tolerated.
 - 2. Shirts: Color Conservative solids, plaids, and prints. Style collar type neck with sleeves. Writing on shirts is limited to appropriate personal monograms, your school

name or logo. These writings are limited to the pocket area of the shirt. Shirts must be tucked into slacks.

- 3. Sweaters are to be worn in good taste. These may be worn as long as a collared shirt is worn underneath. Jackets and coats are to be worn in good taste. Generally these are inappropriate to be worn in the classroom.
- 4. Male students' hair should be worn in a masculine style, neatly trimmed and tapered, not obscuring the eyebrows or hanging below the collar in the back. It should be worn above the middle of the ear. Extremes in hair styles that call undue attention to the haircut (such as shaving above the ears) will not be tolerated. (I Cor 11:3-16)
- 2. Student appearance should enhance a Christian's testimony of a life adhering to biblical principles rather than worldly standards generated by anti-biblical philosophies such as those of secularism, humanism, hedonism, and the alcohol/drug abuse/rock culture. (Eph 4:17-19, 5:17-21; Col 2:8, 3:17, 23)
- 3. Appropriateness, cleanliness and neatness of appearance is related to health, general social acceptance, good habit building, and the principle of deference (limiting freedom in order not to offend the wishes of those in authority). (Rom 13:1-2; 1 Cor 11:16; Eph 5:21; Col 3:17)
 - a. Specific clothing requirements may be waived or required by the Principal for special occasions such as "Grub Day," "Western Day," or "Dress-up Day."
 - b. School Physical Education (P.E.) shorts and shirt will be required for all 05-6A P.E. classes with any standard gym shoes and white socks. Students not prepared for class will have a reduction in their grade.





hat aspirations do you have for your children? We all, I'm sure, want our children to be successful in life. Success, as evaluated by God and by the world, can be quite different. Nevertheless, both perspectives see value in what Christians understand to be Christian character traits - things like honesty, reliability, responsibility, and respect for those in authority. Even Christian families, however, are finding that many obstacles hinder development of godly character in their children. Godless education doesn't help, and part of the motivation you have for choosing RBCS is to get help in developing Christian character and biblical values in your child. Also, today's entertainment media, including movies, music, and TV, mock biblical values. It's hard for children to develop respect for parents who are laughing at sitcom humor based upon disrespect.

Let's focus on the respect issue. We know that respect for authority begins with respect for parental authority. God says: "Children obey your parents in the Lord, for

this is right. HONOR YOUR FATHER AND MOTHER (which is the first commandment with a promise), THAT IT MAY BE WELL WITH YOU, AND THAT YOU MAY LIVE LONG ON THE EARTH." (Eph 6:1-3) Rom 13:1-8 teaches the general application of respect for God-established authority. If children are not trained carefully at home and school, but are allowed to display a disrespectful attitude, we will not be helping them to develop the keys to success.

I think there has been a deterioration of respect in youth that has been getting worse over the past two decades. While several students at RBCS demonstrate excellent training in the home, many do not. I believe we need to make a concerted effort - you in your home and all of us on the RBCS staff from bus drivers to classroom staff to develop respectful character in our children. Although it is fundamentally a matter of the heart, we must teach the principles of manifesting the heart God wants us to have. Let's all require polite speech from our children, and consistently






